The Farmers Organisation Network in Ghana (FONG) is a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) made up of over 400 groups (farmer and fisher based organisations) with over 350,000 individual members. Members are family farmers, smallholder farmers, fishers and pastoralists. It has national coverage.

The network was formed in 2003 by three founding organisations, the Ecumenical Association for Sustainable Agriculture and Rural Development (ECASARD), Development Action Association (DAA) and Business and Development Consultancy Centre (BADECC). Initially membership was possible only through those three organisations, but over time, individual farmers organisations could join directly.

Since its formation, FONG has received funding and worked in partnership with different donors including FAO, IFAD, AgriCord, Agriterra, Agence Française de Développement, the Business Sector Advocacy Challenge Fund, European Union, Swiss Development and Cooperation Agency, USAID, MoFA and others. In 2008, FONG established a relationship with the Réseau des organisations paysannes et de producteurs de l'Afrique de l'Ouest (ROPAA) and has been receiving funding and other support from ROPPA since.

FONG has a National Secretariat in Accra and as well as three zonal operational clusters namely Northern, Middle and Southern farmer zones/secretariats and leadership. It has four core interventions areas:

- Facilitating/supporting capacity building and the provision of institutional support to members
- Policy engagement/influencing
- Provision of agricultural economic support/advisory services
- Communication and knowledge management

It undertakes the following:

- Enhancing the capacity of member organizations to enable them achieve their aim and objectives.
- Advocating for good and appropriate agriculture policies for the benefit of small scale farmers and fisherfolks in Ghana.
- Creating the platform for learning through information dissemination, exchange visits, experience documentation and sharing
- Collaborating with other national or international networks that share our vision and aspirations
- Promoting the adoption of sustainable natural resource management practices associated with agriculture

Members engage in the cultivation, processing and marketing of food and tree crops, vegetables as well as poultry, fish and livestock farming.

Some of the success of FONG over the past year include the following:

- More FONG members are adopting new technologies and innovations in production due to trainings and education programmes offered by FONG and its partners
- Linking all our members to MoFA for government programmes support such as registering them for subsidies fertiliser, seed, farm tools and agro-chemicals
- Many smallholder farmers specially women in FONG membership have received award from government and other recognised organisations
- Resolving conflicts between herders and crop farmers is improving peaceful coexistence in FONG operational areas
- Participation of FONG members in both national and international trade fairs mostly supported by ROPPA has boost members trade volumes and turnovers
- Supporting some members with cottage industries to acquire modern tools and equipment has improved value addition and increased volumes of production processed products

- Established commodity platforms such as FONG Rice Forum etc. enabled members to better aggregate, store and market produce
- Growing consumption of value added agricultural products in Ghana due to vigorous policy change advocacy and capacity building interventions carried by FONG and its partners, members incomes are growing
- Since the introduction of the celebration of the International Rural Women's Day in partnership with FAO, GIZ and other partners, members of our women collage have expanded their enterprises through product exhibitions and as a platform for training and networking

SECTION 2: FONG ANNUAL ACTIVITY DECRIPTION

1.0 Background of the implementation of activities

With an estimated 44.7% of the workforce employed in the agriculture sector, farming, forestry and fisheries are not only central activities to Ghana's economy but are key components of society. However, the strengthening of the sector was brought into stark assisted by the Covid-19 pandemic, during which local food prices increased in some parts of the country. While the country is a key producer of cocoa, the development of value-added activities related to processing agricultural commodities remains difficult. Other challenges include climate change, deforestation, lack of mechanisation tools and the difficulty smallholder farmers trying to reach economies of scale. Overall, performance in the next few years strongly depends on the ability to create new methods for financing within the sector.

The Agriculture sector expanded by 1.0 percent in 2nd quarter 2022 compared to 1.5 percent in the 1st quarter of 2022. The Fishing sub-sector declined by 3 percentage points from 4.7 percent in 1st Quarter 2022 to 1.7 percent in 2nd quarter 2022. The growth of Crops & Cocoa sub-sectors slowed to 1.0 percent from 1.3 percent in the 1st quarter of 2022. The Livestock subsector declined marginally to 1.2 percent from 1.3 percent recorded in the 1st quarter of 2022. The Forestry and Logging sub-sector contracted by 0.1 percent rate in the 2nd quarter of 2022 (Sept. 20, 2022, GSS). Besides government financial support through the budget and special projects, donor funding is very significant, almost 42% in 2019. On the other hand IGF contribution to Agriculture funding is less than 1% (*Ghana Agriculture Medium Term Expenditure Framework, 2020 -2030*)

FONG's is grateful to Government for the current flagship programme "Planting for Food and Jobs" (PFJ) Campaign, which has many of the staple crops especially rice as one of the focal crops for promotion. The PFJ has support includes;

- Subsidized improved seeds to farmers,
- Subsidized fertilizers to farmers,
- Provided dedicated extension services to farmers
- Marketed made in Ghana rice among others

FONG 2022 Activity Plan was also possible because of the cooperation of members, executives and staff. Our donor partners such as ROPPA, GIZ, IFAD, FAO Government Agencies etc. are all part of the success made with the year.

2.0 Overview of FONG planned year 2022.

In the 2021/2022 fiscal year, FONG planned to execute 14 main activities nationwide. These activities were planned to cover the northern, middle and southern zones of Ghana within the currently 16 administrative and political regions. FONG three zoning system is devised to cut down administrative cost and stretch. The table below is a snap short or an overview of the activities implemented this year.

4.0 Analysis of FONG contribution to the implementation of national agricultural policy

Planting for Food and Jobs (PFJ) is the carrent Ghana Government flagship program in the agricultural sector. Accordent to the 2023 budget statement of the government, PFJ is s in its sixth year of implementation. Since its inception in 2017, the programme has made significant contributions to the growth of agriculture and food security in the country. The planks of success include increased adoption of improved seeds and fertilizer from 11 percent in 2016 to 53 percent and 8kg/ha to 25kg/ha respectively. Among others, this has culminated in a vibrant seed industry with growing interest from private actors. In 2022, the focus of PFJ programme had been on four key commodity clusters or value chains namely: cereals (maize, rice, and sorghum); legumes (soybean, cowpea, and groundnut); vegetables (tomato, onion, pepper, cabbage, cucumber, lettuce, and carrot); and roots & tubers (cassava and orange fleshed sweet potato).

FONG activities such as linking farmers to access quality inputs and policy educcation to help farmers access government programs has contributed to gains PFJ has made in 2022.

Some where in October 2022, Bank of Ghana withdrew support to traders importing rice, poultry products, cooking oil, fruit juices etc to redirect investment in a import substitution activities. Before this announcement, FONG and its partners have been in the space of promoting Made in Ghana Rice and Eat Ghana Rice. The Made in Ghana Rice compaign begain with FONG launching the FONG Rice Platforms in Ghana this year.

5.0 FONG Progress Regarding the Following Topics

5.1 Gender:

Women in Agriculture Development is one of the technical directriat under the Ministry of Food and Agriculture in Ghana. The Directriat has units such as

- Nutrition: Food based nutrition education in relation to food production and diet improvement.
- Value addition: Food processing and preservation
- Food Safety: markets and processing and urban peri urban agricultural (UPA) production sites
- Gender mainstreaming of all agricultural policies, programs and projects

In Ghana, the majority of women are engaged in agriculture as their main economic activity. Ghanaian women in agriculture are gaining influence and equitable treatment in increasing ways. Women contribute to around 70% of the country's agricultural production, marketing and processing, yet they face several challenges. These challenges involve lack of ownership and limited access to productive and arable land, low literacy rates, lack of access to information, low participation in agricultural governance, poverty and insufficient access to credit facilities (BORGEN Magazine, 2021)

FONG is therefore commited to be gender sensetive through gender mainstreamed activities and gender tailored activities.

5.2 Agro-ecology:

Eventhough the Ghana Agricultural Investment Plan through the PFJ document is as part promote commercial agriculture, FONG Strategic Plan insist on agricultural production systems that promote agroecology-sustainable farming practices for sustainable food security.

5.3 Youth:

FONG strategy for youth is clear and will in 2023 put youth at the center for promoting new technology and mechanization of food systems and production practices. Youth, like women, face the general challenges of agriculture, but in addition they have problems that are peculiar to them. Some of those extra challenges include:

- Even more difficulty acquiring land for agriculture. Many young people would not have built enough capital to meet the cost of agriculture land acquisition, inputs, labour, equipment etc
- The limited capital makes it difficult for them to acquire land for cultivation and the seed livestock and structures needed for livestock and poultry production. The demand for collateral for credit works against them.
- The lack of experience unlike older farmers.

Given the growing pool of unemployed youth and its possible explosive effects on the country, agriculture is one sector that could attract and engage the youth profitably, while contributing to the development of the economy as a whole.

6.0 Main difficulties and lessons learned

Salary funding for FONG staff for now and the next 5-year strategic period: Today, FONG finally has a five-year strategic plan, which will begin in 2023 and ends in 2027. However, the initial challenge is how FONG will sustain the running of its National and Zonal Secretariats to coordinate monitor and evaluate the implementation of the strategic plan over the five years. Currently, FONG secretariats are not fully staffed, few staff recruited are not paid regularly. Also, there is no single vehicle for official trips to the field while office space is inadequate.

With a nationwide coverage and about 35000 farmers, FONG's potential to influence government policies and programs for the benefit of Smallholder Farmers and Family Farms for an increased food production is highly potent and unavoidable. FONG would be extremely honoured and favoured to have a stable administrative funding support for the next five years.

7.0 Outlook for 2023

FONG interns to outline 2023 Annual Operational Plan (AOP) emanating from the new five-year Strategic Plan. The AOP will take into account outstanding activities from 2022 planned activities such as:

- 1. Organize Annual General Meeting
- 2. Salary funding for the National Secretariat staff within the next 5-year strategic period
- 3. Organise stakeholder/partner/donor engagement meetings to share strategic plan

As part of our focus in 2023 is to enestly support ROPPA Strategic Plan which is probably ending this year to achieve its objectives and made the needed impact to member platforms, family farmers and the peasant farmer of the twenty fist century.

As stated in the 2023 budget of the Government of Ghana, Government will continue to run the Planting for Food and Jobs Program, promote the use of organic fertilizers due to the rising cost of chemical fertilizers in the world market, regulate the export of staples especially grains and is expecting to produce 3500MT of catfish generating about 175 million Ghana cedis. FONG aims at strategizing to position its members to take take full advantage of government programs and project. Furthermore, FONG will like to use the new strategic plan to foster partnerships and cooperations among stakeholders. The hope is to ensure sustainable funding for the five-year strategic plan and consolidate FONG visibility and influence in the agricultural space in Ghana and beyond.

SECTION 4: IDENTIFYIED EXPERIENCES SHARED

9.0 Major experiences 1:

"Through the IWRD, women received financial support from YAPRA Rural Bank for 5 groups in the Bono East Region Promotion of economic activities carried out by women or young people within, downstream or alongside family farms"

Context: The first World Rural Women Day was observed on 15 October 2008. This new international Day was established by the General Assembly in its resolution 62/136 of 18 December 2007 recognizes The Critical role and contribution of rural women including indigenous women; in enhancing agricultural and rural development, improving food security and eradicating rural poverty

Since 2010, FONG has been celebrating IRWD as part of its annual projects to honour the Women Collage of the membership. In the last event, over five hundred (500) rural women were drawn from all over Ghana. These were representations from over twelve (12) regions in Ghana. They came with processed and raw produce from their farms and their (micro) small enterprise factories to exhibit and also to make business

The district that hosted the event has benefited from the Planting for Food and Jobs Programs (MoFA) where 2,491 males and 1,660 females were registered. A total of 13,100 of NPK fertilizers were distributed to a total of 1,434 males and 194 females, again, a 1000bags of 25kg urea were distributed to 198males and 25females. Under the Planting for Exports and Rural Development (PERD), 100,00seedlings of polyclonal cashew were raised, out of which 53,650 were distributed to 246farmers comprising, 195males and 51females, the distribution is still ongoing. Under the Modernizing Agriculture in Ghana (MAG) Program, a total of 1,920 homes and farm visits were made by 7 agricultural agents, 2,113 farmers have been trained on various topics on good agricultural practices geared towards agricultural modernization in the district.

Actions: Community durbar

Approach: Committee meeting in a form of a ceremony to show appreciation and support to the activities of Rural Women in farming and related businesses. In this meeting, selected leaders of key stakeholder address the gathering. The key stakeholders include government ministries and agencies, private sector companies, civil society organization, international agencies, community members and chiefs. Also, the Rural Women Farmers exhibited thier produce as part of the durbar where all participant have access to see, interact and buy farmers produce etc.

Achievements/outcomes: Rural Women learnt about climate smart vegetables production, how to negotiate with the rural banks for low interest rates, Nutrition and how to keep their families secured, network with business partners and made some sales. Over twenty women received awards ranging from cloth, basins, cutlasses, organic fertilizer and spraying machines

Partners: Prang Traditional Council, Member of Parliament Pru West District Assembly, Ministry of Food and Agriculture (MoFA), Ghana Education Service (GES), MEDIA_ADOM TV, KESBEN TV, Condor Radio and Various women groups

10.0 Major experiences 2:

"FONG and members increased effords in revenue mobilisation (14% achieved so far)"

Context: The processing and marketing of agricultural products (agribusiness) represent a major sector of industry in Ghana and create many jobs. Micro, small and medium-sized

enterprises (MSMEs) contribute up to 70 per cent of Ghana's economic output. However, only 20 per cent of the agricultural and natural products produced are further processed in the country itself.

Many agribusiness companies need support to become more competitive and, for example, improve their supply chain management. Moreover, they often lack access to financial resources for long-term investments. Women entrepreneurs in particular need advice in order to prevail in a still male-dominated market (GIZ-June, 2022).

Experts trainings and coaching on service development and revenue generation, a "Training for Sustainable Growth for Jobs" program for Member-Based Business Organizations (MBBOs) in the Agriculture Sector was, consists of 4 modules. The program will support MBBOs to identify those areas in their orgdelivered to FONG management Staff.

MBBO's as advocates first has a role is to create a conducive environment for businesses to operate and grown by influencing policy and the regulatory environment, so that it supports business growth, development and job creation. This function is executed through lobbying and advocacy.

MBBOs as service providers also has to provide some kind of direct services to its own members; services that include gathering and circulation of current and relevant information, reports, funds, trade opportunities, advice and direct representation and appropriate third party intervention. It is these services which typically attract and retain its members.

Actions: Workshops, Coaching sessions, Peer review meetings

Approach: Service Development and Revenue Generation' Training. This 1.5 day Training will take place in the context of a coaching phase stretching over a time period of approximately 3 months with regular interactions between the participating organizations and the trainers who will support to backstop the implementation of ideas and plans elaborated jointly during the training. Prior to the training a brief kick-off session with each partner organization will be organized by the trainers to exchange on current services and revenue flows.

Achievements/outcomes: Access to Scaleup resource materials and network, FONG developed revenue mobilization action plan which fed into FONG new strategic plan, FONG membership dues collection drive improved, FONG considering registering a profit making entity to venture into corporate projects.
